FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

Greetings to staff, students, parents and community members, welcome to another edition of the Forest Crescent Primary School Newsletter. I trust that this newsletter finds you well as we race towards the middle of Term 2. Teachers are currently working hard to collect data on students to complete the reporting process for Semester 1 and students are working hard to ensure that their report is the best it can be! Well done to everyone as we strive to maintain our high academic and social standards!

Farewell: Our amazing gardener Mr Hamill has announced his retirement effective from 28 May. Mr Hamill is currently on annual leave and will not be returning to Forest Crescent, except for a farewell function next Friday. Mr Hamill has worked in the garden with Mrs Hillson since 2016 and at the age of 86 thought it was time to "smell the roses" and not keep pruning them! Mr Hamill is moving to country Victoria to be closer to his family and we wish him all the best on his well earned retirement (Mr Hamill also worked 2 days a week as a cleaner at Bateman Primary School!)

Student Attendance: Forest Crescent Primary School community values education and has set an ambitious target for student attendance rate at 94% attendance.

Currently we are averaging 92% for this semester which is very pleasing however we still have room for further improvement. Our 92% attendance rate is made up of 438 students who have regular attendance (greater than 90%), 104 students who may be at risk indicated (attending between 80% - 90%), 36 students at moderate risk (attending between 60% - 80%) and 13 students at severe risk (attending less than 60%). Of those 13 students, 5 have been for extended holidays. Miss Sandhu, as Deputy Principal attendance works with teachers to identify students who may be falling below the acceptable levels of attendance.

Why is going to school so important for your children?

- At school, many concepts such as literacy and numeracy are taught in a sequence. Missing school means missing out on learning – which can often make it difficult to catch up later. This is particularly important when essential foundation skills are being taught.
- Going to school every day helps children learn the important life skill of 'showing up' – at school, at work, to sport and other commitments.
- Research from the Western Australian Telethon Kids Institute shows that every day at school counts towards a student's learning. Students who attend more, generally do better at school and in life.
- Going to school each day helps children develop positive relationships with teachers and friendships with other students.

I have attached to the newsletter a Department of Education document outlining "When is it OK to miss school?" At the end of Term 2 I am accountable to the School Board to provide our attendance statistics and outline reasons why we may have not met our target of 94%. Attending school everyday is important and I look forward to working with our school community to reach our 94% target which we did regularly pre covid!

National Walk Safely to School Day: Last Friday students and parents had the opportunity to participate in the National Walk Safely School Day. Now in its 24th year, National Walk Safely to School Day (WSTSD) is an annual event when all Primary School children are encouraged to walk and commute safely to school. The objectives of WSTSD are:

- To encourage parents and carers to walk to school with primary school age children and reinforce safe pedestrian behaviour.
- To promote the health benefits of walking and help create regular walking habits at an early age.
- To ensure that children up to 10 years old hold an adult's hand when crossing the road.
- To help children develop the vital road-crossing skills they will need as they become mature pedestrians.
- To reduce the car dependency habits that are being created at an early age and which will be difficult to change as children become adults.
- To promote the use of Public Transport.
- To reduce the level of air pollution created by motor vehicles.
- To reduce the level of traffic congestion.
