**SWOOPING MAGPIES:** As we head in to spring, Magpies are notorious for swooping, which is done to protect the bird's territory when it feels its nest is threatened during nesting season. Nesting season tends to last around 4-6 weeks. We have several magpies who nest around the school and even the average swoop is not a fun experience! It is important to take precautions against the possibility of swooping by managing our own behaviour, rather than that of the magpies.

- Be vigilant pay attention and know nesting areas in and around our neighbourhood.
- Inform others let others know where the magpies are swooping.
- Never harass magpies don't throw rocks or sticks. A magpie who has experienced harassment will cease to trust humans.
- Take evasive action Keep calm, walk quickly but don't run. Try to keep your eye on the magpie as they usually attack from behind, but don't look up! As you walk away try to maintain eye contact.
- Try not to return magpies have an incredible memory and will attack the same people again and again.

Generally the magpies on school grounds near the bike racks, and the flag pole have not been swooping aggressively, but just letting us know that they are around. If we continue to take the above precautions, we should be able to get through the swooping season! One of the amazing environmental aspects of our school is the variety of birds that use our school to nest. A number of pink and grey galahs have taken up home in the bird boxes built around the school, swallows have made a nest in our undercover area, and several Willy Wagtail nests have also been spotted around the school. Please make sure that we respect all of our wildlife and be careful to not affect their spring breeding season.

**SCHOOL WATCH:** Unfortunately, during the upcoming school holidays schools can become the targets of vandalism. A reminder to all community members that the school grounds, apart from the oval and upper basketball courts are out of bounds over the holiday period. Please be on the lookout for any suspicious behaviour around our school over the holidays as it is distressing for both the students and staff to return and find damage to our school.

#### WHAT TO LOOK FOR

- The most important times for you to be vigilant are during school holidays as schools are unattended and therefore more vulnerable than usual to crime.
- Keep in mind that schools are generally large physical areas with multiple "blind spots". If you hear unusual noises from within a school, such as glass breaking or banging noises, this might mean people are up to no good.

 Look for unusual vehicles parked at a school on weekends or during holidays.

- Watch for groups "hanging around" on school grounds.
   This should not occur and can be one of the starting points for crime to occur.
- Should you see any suspicious behaviour please call School Watch on 1800 177 777 or police on 131 444.

**CLASS PLACEMENT 2025:** Appropriate student class placement is a critical school operational process, ensuring the continuing successful performance of our students. The class placement process for 2025 will be very similar to 2024. Initial class placement meetings will be held by staff during year level meetings from Weeks 3-6 of Term 4 based on the current class placement policy....

- In general Year 1 3 classes are not to exceed 24 students and year 4-6 classes are not to exceed 32 students with grouped (composite) classes having one less student.
- As school populations are generally unevenly spread across grades, these class sizes can only be achieved by forming a number of composite (e.g. 4/5) classes.
- It is recognized that the school administration will determine appropriate class size in consultation with staff given the circumstances and programs at the school level
- Allocation processes commence in term 4 of the year and involves the recommendation of the current year class teachers who have had the opportunity to evaluate their students and input from previous teachers where necessary.
- Social justice factors as well as academic attainment, social and group dynamics are taken into account.
- Parental consultation will take place in respect to students on Special Needs Programs and the placement of twins or siblings in the same class.
- Parents will be given the opportunity to make submissions to the principal in regards to class placement for the next year during term 4 prior to class lists being established.

Classes are to be formulated according to the following:

- · Mixed ability classes spread of IEP/SAER students.
- · Behaviour management class dynamics.
- Gender balance where possible.
- Friendship groups try for at least 3 peer friends.

Parents are requested to email or write to the Principal with any requests for class placement. These requests need to be educationally based and not request a specific teacher. Placement requests close on Friday 1 November 2024.

At all times the determination regarding placement of students will be based on educational grounds. The ultimate responsibility for the placement rests with the principal. As all class lists are draft and could change depending on future enrolments or staff movements, publication of class lists will be on Monday 3 February via class lists being placed in the undercover area. (Students commence on Wednesday 5 February).

### "Riding for Hope" with Greg Hire

As you are aware, our school has had numerous mental health and wellbeing incursions since 2019 with A Stitch in Time. This year, the program branched from upper primary to Year 1 to Year 4 having a session too, which was supported by Telethon. This year, students have had sessions from



facilitators including Greg Hire and Brad Robbins (ex- Perth Wildcats), Blair Evans (Olympian), Marksman Lloyd (Music Artist), Ben Popham (Paralympian) and Michelle (Mental Health and Wellbeing Counsellor). A Stitch in Time is also our Kids 4 Kids fundraising charity.

ASIT's founder, Greg Hire, is about to launch on an epic adventure, all in the name of raising awareness and support for Youth Mental Health. Aptly named, Riding for Hope', Greg will be heading to Kununurra to start his journey on the 28<sup>th</sup> August, to ride on his bike back to Perth, arriving on 27<sup>th</sup> September. In all, he will pedal for 3674kms. He hopes that raising this awareness will also help to raise more funds for A Stitch in Time, so that more programs can be provided to schools across the state.

As a partnership school, FCPS hope to support Greg in his ride. Of course, we can't be on the road with him, but we have another idea. Together with the 'Your Move' student leaders, Miss Sandhu is encouraging students who ride to school to keep a log book. In this log book, students with their parents write how many kms the child has ridden each day. Students then take their log book to the Your Move student leaders who will be set up in the undercover area each morning before school. They get their log book stamped, and the number of kms written will be stamped into our bog FCPS logbook. Whether a child rides 1km or 10kms, all will be added to help us achieve a school goal of 3674kms ridden. We hope to achieve this goal by the school holidays, starting on 28th August. As Greg is riding on the weekends, we will count any kms ridden on the weekend too. It's a great way to encourage going for a ride.

The school's logbook during the day will be kept in the library for students to see our school progress. Mrs Lambert has set up a display of Greg's journey, including a map which will follow his progress. For

parents to follow along Greg's ride, head to A Stitch in Time's Facebook and Instagram pages for updates and a link to donate to his ride if you like.

Hope, connection and to help make everyone feel their best is what its all about. We hope your child can join us in this project. If they are interested, the special 'Riding for Hope' log books will be available in the front office from Tuesday 27<sup>th</sup> August. Remember ride safe and have those helmets on.
