FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK Dear Parents,



Last week, I was fortunate enough to spend time with our Year 6 students in the bush block next to the Kindy. As many of you may already know, these students are taking part in an exciting pilot conservation project, run over two years in collaboration with the Festival of Perth and the University of Western Australia.

This project is much more than just an environmental initiative. It includes a research component that explores both the students' connection to nature and the ways in which teachers are using the natural environment as a powerful teaching tool. There is also a strong focus on the benefits of integrating art and nature into the broader curriculum.

The students have been imagining what the bush block might look like in sixty years' time, and how it might feel to spend time in that space decades from now.

Through a combination of art, storytelling, and

conservation science, the project is encouraging deep reflection and creative thinking.

What strikes me most is how beautifully this work reflects the value of *respect*—in this case, respect for our environment. It's a wonderful example of how our values are not just taught but lived through meaningful learning experiences.

This reflection led me to notice the many everyday ways our students show respect for their surroundings. Whether it's packing away sports equipment, putting lunch rubbish in the bin, or choosing to run across the grass but not through the garden beds, our students consistently show care for their school environment. I want to take this opportunity to acknowledge all our students for the many ways—big and small—they demonstrate environmental respect. I'm very much looking forward to following the senior students' progress in the coming months, and to see how their involvement in this project shapes their attitudes and behaviours towards the world around them.
