

#### Safety House

The Safety House program was established in Victoria in 1979, as a National community based and funded program designed to support the safety of children while in transit to and from school. The program has since been discontinued, in some states, as an increasing number of children are being driven to school and there are a lower number of stay-at-home parents. The program still runs independently in Western Australia and Forest Crescent PS continues to be an active member.

The program provides:

children with the skills and confidence to feel safe



a network of safe places for children within the community

The distinctive yellow smiling house logo allows children to easily recognise an approved safety house as a safe place to go when they feel scared or threatened. School education programs reinforce the role which Safety House plays for children.

Children are as individual and as different as their parents and making decisions about what's best for raising children is very personal.

The Raising Children website offers up-to-date, research-based material on more than 800 topics spanning child development, behaviour, health, nutrition and fitness, play and learning, connecting and communicating, school and education, entertainment and technology, sleep and safety.

It covers <u>grown-ups</u>, <u>newborns</u> (0-3 months), <u>babies</u> (3-12 months), <u>toddlers</u> (1-3 years), <u>preschoolers</u> (3-5 years), <u>school-age children</u> (5-9 years), <u>pre-teens</u> (9-11 years), and <u>early teens</u> (12-15 years).

There are tips, videos and other useful resources.

The Raising Children Network provides information that can help parents with the day-to-day decisions of raising children. It also provides information to help parents and carers look after their own needs. The information is based on the best science in parenting, child health and development, presented in language we can all understand.

#### Dental health - Keep your child's teeth healthy

Teeth help children to eat, speak and smile. Regularly brushing teeth can prevent bad breath, tooth decay, and gum diseases.

Parents and guardians can help children to keep their teeth clean. Some tips are:

- Children below 6 years can use small smear (small pea sized) amount of low fluoride children's toothpaste
- Children 6 years and older can use pea-sized amounts of standard fluoride toothpaste
- Encourage children to brush their teeth morning and night, and supervise tooth brushing until they are 8 or 9 years old
- Use an age-appropriate toothpaste and toothbrush
- Educate children about healthy eating habits and limit sugary foods and drinks
- Encourage them to choose water as their preferred drink
